

Coronavirus (COVID-19) in veterinary and animal group settings: Protecting people and animals

Coronavirus (COVID-19) is currently sweeping the globe with many people currently sick with the disease. The virus is quickly spreading within areas and moving to new locations. The World Health Organization has recently classified the situation as a pandemic.
